

VOICE FROM THE PEWS

Augustine sermon 65:

"The lesson of the Holy Gospel builds us up into the duty of praying and believing, and of not putting our trust in ourselves, but in the Lord. What greater encouragement to prayer than the parable which is proposed to us of the unjust judge? For an unjust judge, who feared not God, nor regarded man, yet gave ear to a widow who besought him, overcome by her importunity, not inclined thereto by kindness. If he then heard her prayer, who hated to be asked, how must He hear who exhorts us to ask? "

According to St. Augustine(letter 130), we need not pray for what we need because God already knows what we need before we even ask. "The deeper our faith, the stronger our hope, the greater our desire, the larger will be our capacity to receive the gift, which is very great indeed. The more fervent the desire, the more worthy will be its fruits."

Christians have been persecuted or treated unjustly in many countries because of their faith. The answer to this is prayer and faith that must remain till Christ will come again as judge.

God is not bound by time and space. He is omnipotent and knows what is best for us. We were praying for a placement for my daughter and were disappointed when she did not get it. After a few weeks she secured a placement which was 100 times better than one we prayed for. Like Monica the mother of St Augustine who prayed for the conversion of her son for many years with apparently no answer.

REFLECTION

Have you thought? - A parable about God

When Jesus tells this parable about the widow and the judge, he is actually painting a picture about God for his disciples. This is not to suggest that God needs to be worn down by persistence but rather it is a description of what God is not. If such a wicked and unjust judge can eventually be worn down, how much more quickly will God respond to a just cause? Yet the parable is told to reinforce the need to pray continually. The continuous prayer is not to wear God down – like the judge – but rather to demonstrate the genuine need.

Scriptural Context - Teaching Moments

Since chapter 9 of this Gospel, Jesus has been making a steady journey towards Jerusalem and the events of the Passion that await him there. This whole second half of the gospel is a series of teaching moments as Jesus seeks to prepare his disciples to continue his ministry after he has gone. Remembering that the gospel is written 50 or more years after the events described, the gospel writer has also deliberately structured these teaching moments for the audience of believers struggling day by day to live out the message and ministry of Jesus. As such, these teachings are just as important for modern audiences.

Different View - Convincing God

Does this teaching about the need for continual prayer mean that God needs to be convinced of our cause? Does a one-off prayer not get heard? Is God swayed by the force of numbers? Can the prayers of ten people carry more weight than the prayers of one? All these questions miss the point of the parable. It is not God who needs our prayers, but we who have to recognise, through prayer, our need for God's mercy and gracious love. The constancy of prayer is not to convince God but to remind ourselves of our dependence upon God.

Questions for Adults

Why does Jesus use such unsavoury characters – like the judge – in his parables? Why is it specifically a widow who pleads her case with the unjust judge in this parable? Where and when do you make time to pray? What are the conflicting demands that push prayer from your daily/weekly routine? What positive impact could time spent in prayer have upon these other demands?


Drop your donations to the JRS FOODBANK BOX

SAINT OF THE WEEK

SAINT JOHN STONE

Feast Day: October 25th



John Stone, Doctor of Theology, was an English Augustinian friar who was executed, probably in December 1539. Nothing is known of John's early life, education, or activities in the Order, though it is thought that he joined the Augustinians at Canterbury.

After his ordination, he was sent to Droitwich, where he filled the office of Professor and Prior for some time before returning to Canterbury

The Act of Supremacy of 1534 declared the king to be the only supreme head of the Church in England. This was followed by the Treasons Act. All bishops, priests and religious were required to sign a formal document explicitly acknowledging Henry VIII as head of the church in England.

John refused to sign, and spoke in clear terms of his objections to the king's claims over the Church.

Friar Stone's trial found him guilty under the 1535 Treason Act, the penalty of which was death, and on 27th December 1539 he was executed. Friar John Stone was soon venerated as martyr, beatified by Pope Leo XIII on 9 December 1886, and canonised by Pope Paul VI on 25 October 1970. He is one of the Forty Martyrs chosen to represent Roman Catholics martyred in England and Wales between 1535 and 1679.

Augustinians commemorate him on 25 October even though his Feast Day is May 12.
