It is safe to assume that most people in the crowd would have loved to entertain Jesus in their homes, but Jesus chooses the tax collector who is disliked by all. Undoubtedly, the majority of the people who surround Jesus and Zacchaeus are really good people. So why does Jesus pick Zacchaeus?

Zacchaeus certainly catches Jesus' attention by climbing that tree. He is a person interested in finding out more about Jesus. Maybe it is the crowd's negative reaction when Jesus calls Zacchaeus down that spurs the invitation. Jesus looks at the crowd, and he looks at Zacchaeus and knows the poor fellow needs help.

Two things are clear from this story: God's invitation goes out to all of us, and receiving that invitation doesn't depend on our own worthiness or goodness. It doesn't matter if we are short or tall, great or mediocre. God sees us with the eyes of a loving father. He wants us to

become all we are capable of becoming. He has chosen us and invites himself into our lives. It is up to us to clear the path and invite him in.

Zacchaeus's response is also important to note. He changes. Once a rich man who may have used dubious means to acquire his wealth, he offers to give half of his money to the poor. That is how it should be with us, too. We will know that God is truly living in our hearts when our concern is focused on others, and not just with taking care of ourselves.

REFLECTION

Historical Context – Tax collectors

Tax collectors were hated by most Jews at the time of Jesus. Firstly, the taxes they collected were going to support Rome – a foreign, Gentile power that was an unwelcome occupying force in Palestine. The Jews' taxes were paying the wages of the army that occupied their country, so tax collectors were seen as collaborators with the enemy. Secondly, the system of tax collection lent itself to abuse and corruption. Tax collectors were required to collect a certain amount from their district; any excess they collected was theirs to keep – that was their income.

Scriptural Context – True welcome

Today's passage begins chapter 19 of the gospel of Luke. Later in that same chapter is the account of Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem. In that incident, Jesus is welcomed into Jerusalem by cheering crowds who spread their cloaks on the ground for him to walk over. Those same crowds, just days later, were yelling for Jesus to be crucified. In today's passage, the crowds line the streets of Jericho to welcome Jesus with great fanfare but also quickly turn on him when he acts on the message of acceptance and forgiveness that he has been proclaiming throughout his ministry.

Have you thought? – Conversion

When we hear this story about Zacchaeus, our focus is normally on the conversion of heart that appears to take place within Zacchaeus. However, his determination to see Jesus from the outset suggests that the conversion has already taken place within Zacchaeus. It is the muttering, grumbling crowd who are called to conversion; called to soften their hearts and see a faithful man where they have previously only seen a sinner. Throughout the gospel, the welcome and acceptance Jesus extends to the 'outsider' and the 'sinner' confronts and challenges those who would hold themselves up as being better than these others.

Questions for Adults

What is significant about the fact that this episode takes place in Jericho? What is remarkable about Jesus' first words to Zacchaeus? Why do the people in the crowd complain about Jesus going to the house of Zacchaeus? Where in your community do you see signs of welcome and acceptance? Where do you see the need for welcome and acceptance?

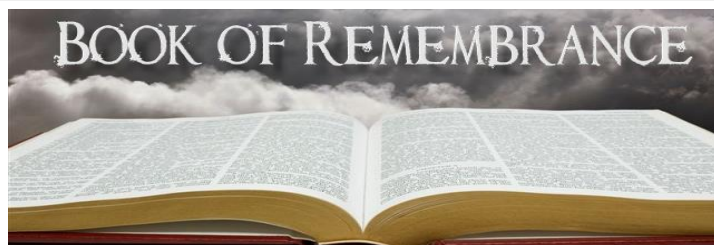

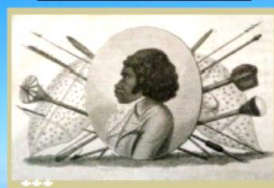

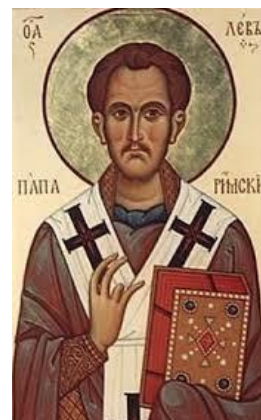
ON A LIGHTER NOTE

SAINT OF THE WEEK

SAINT LEO THE GREAT

Feast Day : 10th November



Pope Saint Leo I, also known as Saint Leo the Great, was born in Tuscany in c. 400. He was pope from 29 September 440 to his death in 461.

He was an Italian aristocrat, and a Doctor of the Church. The doctrine of the Incarnation was formed by him in a letter to the Patriarch of Constantinople.

At the Council of Chalcedon this same letter was confirmed as the expression of Catholic Faith concerning the Person of Christ.

Leo is well known for his great eloquence and writing skills, and many of these writings are of great historical value. Both the sermons and the letters are mostly concerned with theological questions concerning the person of Jesus Christ (Christology) and his role as mediator and saviour (Soteriology).

Leo defends the true divinity and the true humanity of the one Christ against heretical one-sidedness. He takes up this topic also in many of his sermons, and over the years, he further develops his own original concepts.

He was a significant contributor to the centralisation of spiritual authority within the Church and in reaffirming papal authority, and contributed to the development of the doctrine on papal primacy, based on his personal devotion to St Peter.

Saint Leo the Great died in 461. His Feast Day is November 10th.

His feast day is celebrated on 28 February during common years and 29 February during leap years.
