

REFLECTION

Historical Context - Jews and Samaritans

Samaritans descended from one of the tribes of Israel. They held faithful to Mt Gerazim as the first place for the worship of God even when the prophet Elijah declared a new place for worship. In the 7th and 8th Centuries BCE, the Assyrians descended on the Northern and Southern Kingdoms of Israel. The Samaritans in the north assimilated with the Assyrians, whilst the Jews were taken into exile in Babylon. When the Jews returned from exile, the Samaritans offered to assist in the reconstruction of the Temple. This infuriated the Jews and led to centuries of distrust and animosity.

Gospel Focus - Transformation

The woman has obviously come to the well to draw water for herself. Her encounter with Iesus is a moment of transformation for her. At first, she fails to comprehend his reference to 'living water' and never being thirsty again. However, in the end 'the woman put down her water jar and hurried back to the town.' Leaving her water jar behind was a sign of the transformation that had taken place within her. She had indeed drunk of the living water of Jesus and no longer paid attention to the need for water that had brought her to the well.

Living the Gospel - Personal encounter

The Samaritan woman's personal encounter with Jesus compels her to start spreading the good news about the amazing man she has met. She meets Jesus face to face and feels compelled to act on what she has felt. Lent is a time for each of us to again - or for the first time - seek out a face to face encounter with Jesus. Through prayer, contemplation on scripture or reflection on encountering Jesus in the face of others, we build a one to one relationship with Jesus. When we acknowledge this relationship, like the Samaritan woman, we are compelled to act on it.

Questions for Adults

Why is it significant that it was a Samaritan woman Jesus met at the well? In what ways does an historical understanding of the Samaritans assist our understanding of this passage? What is it about her encounter with Jesus that prompts the woman to speak about Jesus in the town? How are we able to come 'face to face' with Jesus today as did the woman at the well?







Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA)

is the process that makes it possible for adults to be received into the Catholic Church.



This weekend we celebrate the first of the THREE SCRUTINIES. Scrutinies and exorcisms are special ritual prayers of the Church which strengthen the Elect in preparation for baptism. Each of the three Scrutinies is intended to bring a growth in holiness to those who would become Catholics and also for the Parish community

Scrutinies are celebrated in order to: Deliver the elect from the power of sin and Satan; protect them against temptation; give them strength in Christ, who is the way, the truth and the life. (John 14:6); help complete the conversion of the elect; deepen their resolve to hold fast to Christ, and to carry out their decision to love God above all.

We are also challenged to take a long careful look (scrutinise) at ourselves and our community. Are we truly a community which offers Christ's living water, light and life?

The scrutiny prayers proclaim God's triumph over evil, and the freedom that is ours through forgiveness and reconciliation. The prayers focus on God's love and merciful compassion for all of us.

Scrutinies encourage us to recognise the presence of sin and its effects on us, our world, and our church. At the same time, they reassure us that Christ is more powerful than the worst evil. They show particularly that no sin is beyond the merciful forgiveness of Christ.

The Scrutinies (those be baptized at Easter) are primarily for the Elect, but we can all take a lesson from their journey.

Please continue to pray for the RCIA and RCIC during the next few weeks as we continue our journey to Easter.

SAINT OF THE WEEK

SAINT JOSEPH

Patron Saint of families, fathers, expectant mothers, workers and carpenters
Feast Day: 19th March



St Joseph, who descended from a royal lineage, was born in Bethlehem in 90 BC, and died in Nazareth, in 18 AD. Scripture tells us that he was a carpenter, the husband of Mary, and the foster father of Jesus.

Joseph was a compassionate, caring man. When he discovered Mary was pregnant after they had been betrothed, he knew the child was not his but was as yet unaware that she was carrying the Son of God. He knew women accused of adultery could be stoned to death, so he resolved to send her away quietly to not expose her to shame or cruelty. However, when an angel came to Joseph in a dream and told him, "Joseph son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary home as your wife, because what is conceived in her is from the Holy Spirit. She will give birth to a son, and you are to give him the name Jesus, because he will save his people from their sins," he did as the angel told him and took Mary as his wife. (Matthew 1:19-25).

Joseph loved Jesus and his one concern was for his safety. When the angel came again to tell him that his family was in danger, he immediately fled to Egypt with Mary and Jesus, and waited there until the angel told him it was safe to go back (Matthew 2:13-23).

Since Joseph does not appear in Jesus' public life, at his death, or resurrection, many historians believe Joseph probably had died before Jesus entered public ministry.
