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VOICE FROM THE PEWS

With whom do we converse and listen to the most? Believe it or not, it is ourselves. We are constantly having conversations with ourselves. Our inner conversations reveal the truth about ourselves. By conversing with ourselves, we find solutions to our challenges, problem solve, formulate opinions, and wrestle with and determine our priorities and values. What other voices affect the conversations we have with ourselves?

Often, voices from our past continue to haunt us. These voices cause us to mistrust our judgment, and cling to our fears of rejection and failure. It is in these inner conversations that we face what holds us captive — our limitations, weaknesses, and sinfulness. We often go about our lives putting out one fire or another, keeping ourselves busy, and trying to stay on top of things. Intentionally or unintentionally, we find ourselves wandering off. We look down at our feet and realize we have lost our anchor. Feeling scared, out of place,

desolate, unsettled, and lonely, we realize that we are lost.

We listened to the wrong voices! In the midst of everything competing for our attention, the voice of the One who could truly call us home got muffled. We didn't hear it. As our inner dialogues continue to play out, the one voice we need to consult — even before our own — is God's. He is the Good Shepherd who can keep us safely where we need to be. Our habits of prayer are the only thing that can properly root us and keep us grounded. Contemplating God's presence and developing an inner awareness of His love, we will then find ourselves praying unceasingly. Suddenly, the inner conversations we are constantly having are no longer just with ourselves or with voices that can lead us astray but with the Trinity, who desperately wants us to stay home.

REFLECTION

Historical Context – A line of shepherds

When Jesus used the image of himself as a shepherd, he named himself as belonging to a Jewish ancestry that associated itself with shepherds. Abraham, Isaac, Jacob and Moses were all shepherds. David, the second King of Israel, was regarded as the greatest king in Jewish history. His humble beginning, captured magnificently in the sculpture by Michelangelo, was as a shepherd boy guarding his flock with a slingshot. The kings of Israel were charged to 'shepherd' their people rather than to lord it over them as the pagan kings did.

Scriptural Context – Psalm 22

Today's responsorial psalm uses Psalm 22 (sometimes referenced as Psalm 23), 'the Lord is my shepherd'. It is a very popular psalm and is often reproduced on Christian posters and other artworks. It was also a popular psalm and image at the time of Jesus. For Jesus to describe himself as the good shepherd caused great distress among the Jewish officials. They saw Jesus as being blasphemous for the psalm makes clear that *the Lord* is the shepherd. Jesus quite deliberately makes clear that he and the Father are one: the Lord is the shepherd and Jesus is the good shepherd.

Gospel Focus – Life to the full

John 10:10 is a very famous quote from this gospel passage. Having life to the full does not imply life filled with every convenience, comfort and wealth. Rather, it is about living a life filled with purpose and intent. If we fail to live with purpose and meaning then our life is a hollow shell of what it could be. Jesus came that we may have life – a life that is at its fullest when it is lived in such a way as to be an expression of what Jesus taught and lived.

Questions for Adults

Why might Jesus have used these images of himself as the gate and as the shepherd? Why might the Jews have been attracted to an image of God as shepherd? How can the concept of 'life to the full' be misunderstood or misused? In what ways is the invitation to have life to the full also a challenge?

WHY DO WE DO THAT?

**Catholic Life Explained:
Discerning Vocations**

Question:

What does it mean to discern a vocation?

Answer:

The word vocation comes from the Latin word vocare, meaning "to call." A vocation is a calling or invitation from God to serve in a particular way. For Catholics, that calling might be as a priest, sister, or married person. Vocation is the way we respond to the invitation to share in God's grace and witness to God's love in the world.

Discerning a vocation is the process in which we pray for God's guidance. We listen for God's message that is often quiet and unassuming in a world filled with noise and distractions. We look at our gifts and talents, seek the advice of others, examine our motives, and listen to see what God is asking of us. The goal of discernment is to follow what the Lord wills, not what we think is the best idea. Many men enter a seminary to discern if that is their vocation, only to discover that their calling is to marriage. Others have resisted the idea for long periods of time, until finally they could resist no more. Some great saints have described that dilemma. Vocation is a human process of divine origin, and each of us must strive constantly to hear the call of God in our lives.

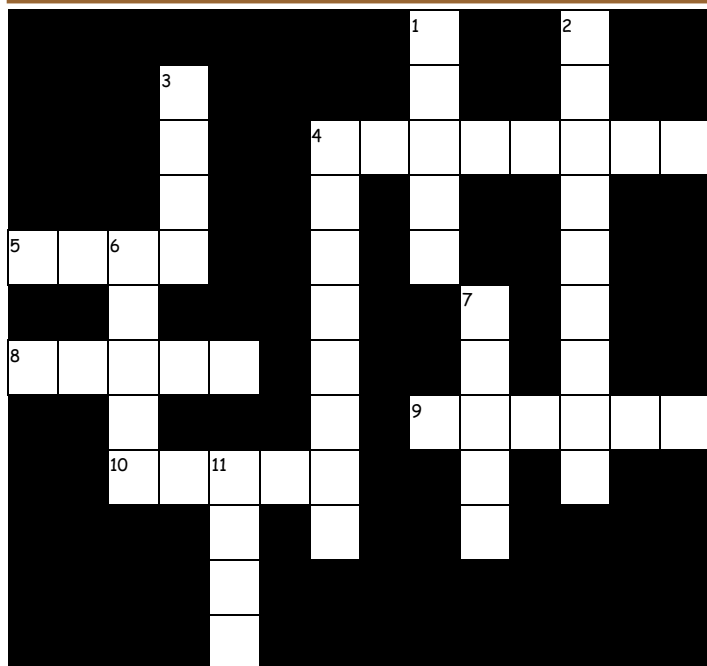

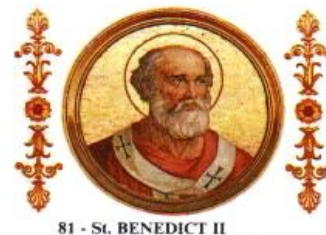

SAINT OF THE WEEK

SAINT BENEDICT II

Patron Saint of Europe

Feast Day : 7th May



Born during the seventh century, Benedict was involved in the Church as a young boy. He attended a choir-school where he studied the Scriptures and sacred chant and grew into a distinguished scholar and singer. Benedict was ordained a priest, who generously and humbly served the poor.

After years of service, Benedict was elected pope in 683. But before he could begin, the emperor had to confirm the election, which had often left the Church without a consecrated leader for a period of time. Indeed, Benedict waited a frustrating 11 months. After he was finally consecrated, Benedict convinced Emperor Constantine IV to abolish the need for imperial confirmation and from then on to allow the Governor of Ravenna to confirm the Church's choice. Benedict was an energetic pope who restored and improved many Roman churches. He also fought the Church's battle against monothelitism, a heresy that denied that Jesus had a human will. Benedict persuaded the Spanish bishops to sign a profession of faith that refuted the heresy and also tried to bring those who had supported the heresy back into the Church. Meanwhile, he continued to serve the needy.

Benedict had such a good relationship with Constantine after the emperor asked him to spiritually adopt his two young sons. Benedict also had a strong bond with his clergy. His distribution of gifts to them on Easter Sunday of 685 was his last official act as pope. He died soon after. Even though he was pope for less than two years, Benedict left a significant mark on the Church, and he is honoured to this day as the patron of Europe.

She tried to take off so I grabbed her by the neck and wrapped her in a blanket so she wouldn't scratch me like she did last time. But it worked! I hauled her down the stairs and threw her into the backyard.... she had better not crap in the vegetable garden again."

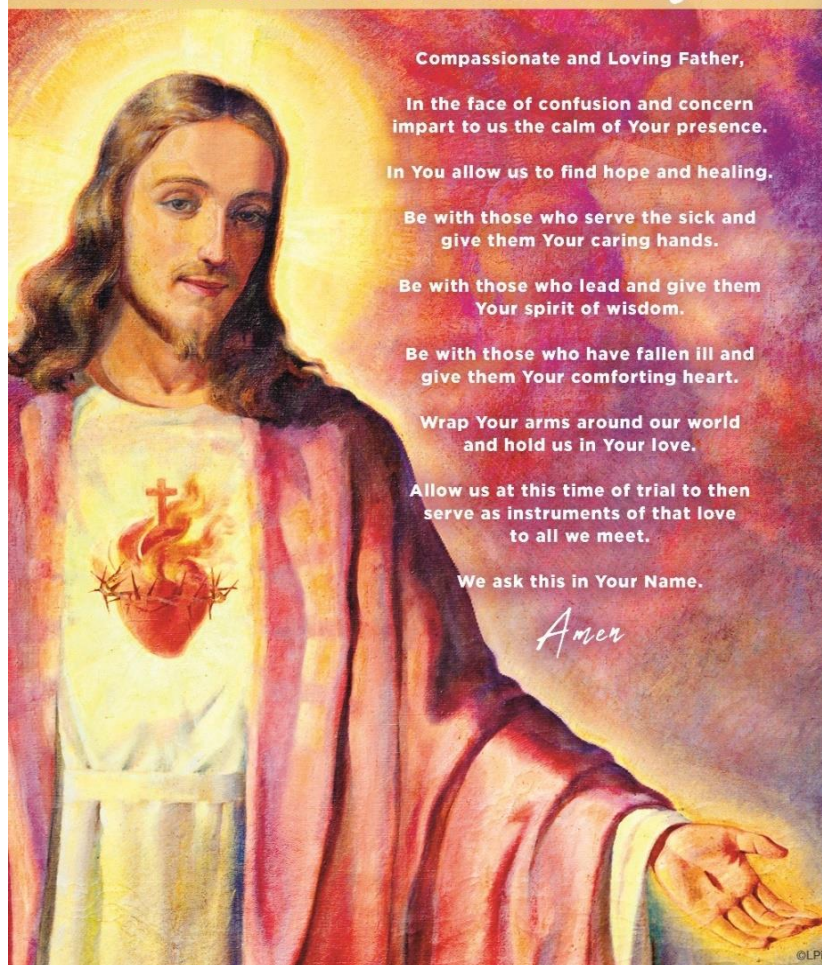
