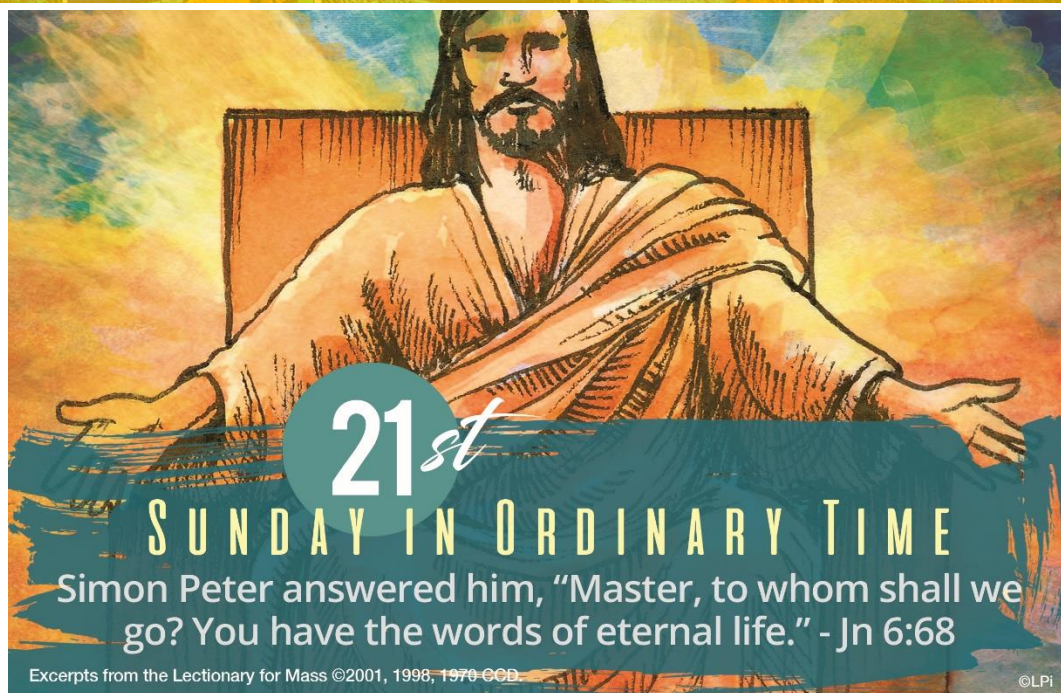

VOICE FROM THE PEWS

This Sunday's Gospel pulls no punches, telling us to eat Jesus' flesh and drink his blood. Read those words without the benefit of faith and centuries of experience celebrating the Eucharist, and see if you don't feel like walking away from the miracle-worker too. It is clear that Jesus expects his followers to devour all that he is; his very being, wholly divine and wholly human.

When we receive the divine Jesus we share in his divinity. We recognize that God is in us and we are in God. When we are one with God we are one with all people and one with all that is. When we receive the human Jesus we take in and accept Jesus' humanity. We accept our own humanness with all of the pain and joy, the uncertainty and limits that this entails.

Like every human, Jesus experienced physical, emotional and spiritual pain. Jesus accepted his humanity with all of its limitations, and we must do the same.

Accepting our humanness means giving up the notion that we can control everything. It means accepting the fact that at times we will have to endure both physical pain and the emotional pain of being embarrassed or abandoned.

When we can truly admit that we cannot do it all, or do everything perfectly, we can ask Jesus to fill us with his strength and love. When this happens we can begin to live in God's grace, God's love. Suffering and disillusionment may not go away, but our focus changes and all of life, the good and not so good, becomes a blessing.

Help your children understand that Jesus is more than a good role model showing us how to live our life in God's grace. Jesus is our sustenance, the very thing we need to be able to live and remain in God's love.

FAMILY RESPONSE: Ask family members to talk about times in their lives when God really helped them.

LIVE THE LITURGY Inspiration for the Week



Many people give their allegiance to something until it asks them to do something challenging or radical. Then, they find themselves rethinking whether they want to be associated with it. The same holds for God. Either we serve God, or we don't. There can be no lukewarm stance with regard to faith. If we are in, then faith in Jesus Christ asks us to do some difficult things: work in service of God's kingdom, love our enemies, offer no resistance to injury, and trust that the Eucharist is in fact Jesus' very Body and Blood. For some, buying into these things may prove too difficult and a return to a life without them is preferred. But truth is truth and it can only be found in God. If we find it hard to accept it from the mouth of Christ, where else can we go to find it? The task before us is to commit to the truth even when it may be easier to pursue something else. Truth is always worth obtaining even when it is difficult. Jesus offers us the truth of life, a life that is found in his own flesh and blood and a life of discipleship.

QUESTIONS OF THE WEEK

First Reading: Joshua, who helped settle the Israelites into the Promised Land, knew the struggle ahead lay in Israel's fidelity to God. How does anyone best show fidelity to God?

Second Reading: Toward the end of his letter, Paul takes up the topic of husbands and wives. He speaks of the importance of mutual subordination and love. What do you see as secret to a successful marriage?

Gospel Reading: Jesus' bread of life discourse ends with the report that "many of Jesus' disciples" no longer followed Jesus. How should we respond to family or friends who choose to walk away from Jesus?

WEEKLY JUSTICE CHALLENGES

If there is a message to hear this week, it is about being ready. The parables foretell the end of the world... be ready for you don't know when that might be. For Christians, that means we need to believe in, think about, and do the right things in life; we need to have our priorities in order. So what does this include? Feed the hungry, clothe the naked, visit those in prison and give drink to those who are thirsty. Spend your life doing these things and you will be prepared.

Why is that? These things shape our hearts and make us humble and willing to put others before ourselves. They help us to see the face of Christ in our midst. It is the crazy paradox of being a Christian. To be first, you must be last. To be a leader, you must be a servant.

Are you ready? What are you spending your time on these days? The challenge this week is to look at your calendar... personal and family. How are you spending your time? Read Matthew 25:31-46, and make sure some of those things make it on your calendar each week.

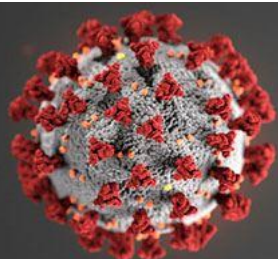

NSW Health has revised the COVID-19 guidelines effective Friday 9 July 2021.

The church is closed to the public but the priests are still available for pastoral assistance. Please contact parish office to make an appointment. Parish Office is open Tuesday to Friday, 9am to 5pm.

Funerals are still permitted with a maximum number of 10 attendees only.

NSW Health continues to mandate that face masks are to be worn at all indoor venues, including places of worship.

Weddings and other celebrations are also not allowed during this period.

Livestreaming of Daily Mass and Rosary are temporarily cancelled due to the rising cases of Covid-19 in our community.

CONTACT TRACING:

For those attending the funeral, NSW Government still requires contact tracing. There are two ways to do this:

- Sign-in using the QR Code displayed near the entrance doors or
- Mass Attendance cards to be completed by each household per mass. Cards are available in the foyer.

Catholics from Parramatta Diocese are still dispensed from their Sunday Mass obligation until further notice

Recognize God In Your Ordinary Moments

Submission as Stewardship

We aren't comfortable with the idea of submission. Our society champions equality, and rightly so — but it's a mistake to think that submission is at odds with equality. To submit ourselves fully, we must first be free. We must first be our own masters. God has granted us that freedom with the salvation He offers. We are no longer the slaves of sin. Now He asks us to be subordinate to one another, in the name of Christ.

What a completely uncomfortable task! What He's asking is for us to be subordinate to the person who irritates us the most. The person we really can't stand. The person who doesn't respect us or appreciate what we have to offer. The person we think we're smarter than, more talented than. The person we envy.

That's the real challenge of stewardship, isn't it? Subordination.

Inconveniencing myself by giving of time, of money, of relationship. Putting the needs or wants of another above my own when they haven't done anything special to earn it.

I invite you to consider the cross — the most radical expression of submission, and of stewardship, that ever existed. If there was ever someone who deserved superiority, isn't it the God who let Himself be nailed to a tree, who gave so freely of His life, His body, His blood, His everything?

To look at him in his agony is to truly understand the beauty of submission — of laying down what you have for the good of the other.

The **Office for Safeguarding** in the Diocese is charged with a mission to work with parishes to build safe worshipping communities. Hence, one of the activities involved in this mission is to ask Parish Volunteers in completing the Safeguarding Training. This is an opportunity and an obligation for us all to develop our awareness and skills in ensuring our parish is a safe and welcoming place for all those, including children and vulnerable adults, who worship alongside us.

Reasons why Safeguarding Training is important...

We are all driven by the call of the Gospel in our lives, in our work and in our parish ministry. We are called to 'love others just as God loves us'. This commandment to love challenges us to actively promote the rights and dignity of all people.

The Diocese of Parramatta, led by Bishop Vincent, is steadfast in its commitment to 'ensure all children and vulnerable adults are safe, protected and enabled to flourish'. Bishop Vincent has also expressed his commitment to us – those involved in the life of a parish – that all volunteers and staff are trained, supported and skilled in their pastoral roles and ministry.

Safeguarding Training is the practical demonstration of our Diocese's support of us in our ministries. It is also an expression of our own care for others, as it offers each one of us support and skills to ensure that the dignity and safety of all those we meet in ministry, especially those of children and adults at risk, is held as a paramount principle within our parish community.

The Mandatory Safeguarding Modules...

Our Church and Parish life exists within the wider community. This means that those volunteers who minister within parishes also have a very real role and responsibility in meeting the challenges and expectations given to us by government and legislation. One example that we have been used to for many years is the 'Working With Children Check'.

The Diocese of Parramatta's Safeguarding Training has been designed in response to the Children's Guardian Act (2019) which was expanded to include religious organization and volunteer workers. Safeguarding Training will help staff and volunteers understand their role and responsibility in ensuring the dignity and safety of all people is upheld.

The Training will help parishioners:

- build knowledge of Safeguarding Principles,
- develop skills in ensuring Child Safe Standards are embedded within our ministries, and
- support understanding of how to recognize and respond to incidents of 'reportable conduct'.

At the present time Safeguarding Modules can be presented online or via zoom presentations. The Safeguarding Office has scheduled a series of dates for zoom training of the Mandatory Modules. The Zoom dates for Modules 1-3 are listed below:

- **Tue 21 Sept – Module 1:** Introduction to Safeguarding - 9.30am to 10.30am
- **Tue 28 Sept – Module 2:** Understanding Child Abuse and Reportable Conduct - 9.30am to 11.00am
- **Tue 5 Oct – Module 3:** Safeguarding Adults at Risk - 9.30am to 11.00am

Once restrictions ease there will also be opportunities for face-to-face training.

All parish ministries and groups are required to undergo a 6-points Safeguarding Training. The three modules mentioned above cover the 6-points that is required of you.

Let the Parish Office know how you would like to participate in the training. If you would like to get started the Parish Office will help you register for the upcoming Zoom training or online modules.

WHY DO WE DO THAT? Catholic Life Explained

Question:

We live in a country that upholds the separation of Church and state. What is the role of Catholics in society?

Answer:

The role of the Church in the world has taken different forms over time, but the theme is the same. Be disciples in it! As the lay faithful — that is, not vowed priest or religious — we are called to live and love in the circumstances of our daily lives. St. John Paul II wrote a document about the laity. In it he wrote, “In their situation in the world God manifests His plan and communicates to them their particular vocation of seeking the Kingdom of God by engaging in temporal affairs and by ordering them according to the plan of God” (*On the Lay Members of Christ’s Faithful*, 15).

God wants us in the hospitals, the board rooms, the law offices, the food pantries, and the little league games! We are to engage in the affairs of the world. But when we’re there, we should live the plan of God. We need to respect those around us, engage in just business and legal practices, and love our children. We should care for the earth, use our money wisely, and get to know our neighbours. We must advocate for social policies that respect human dignity and human freedom. No matter our state in life, we are invited to build the kingdom of God!
