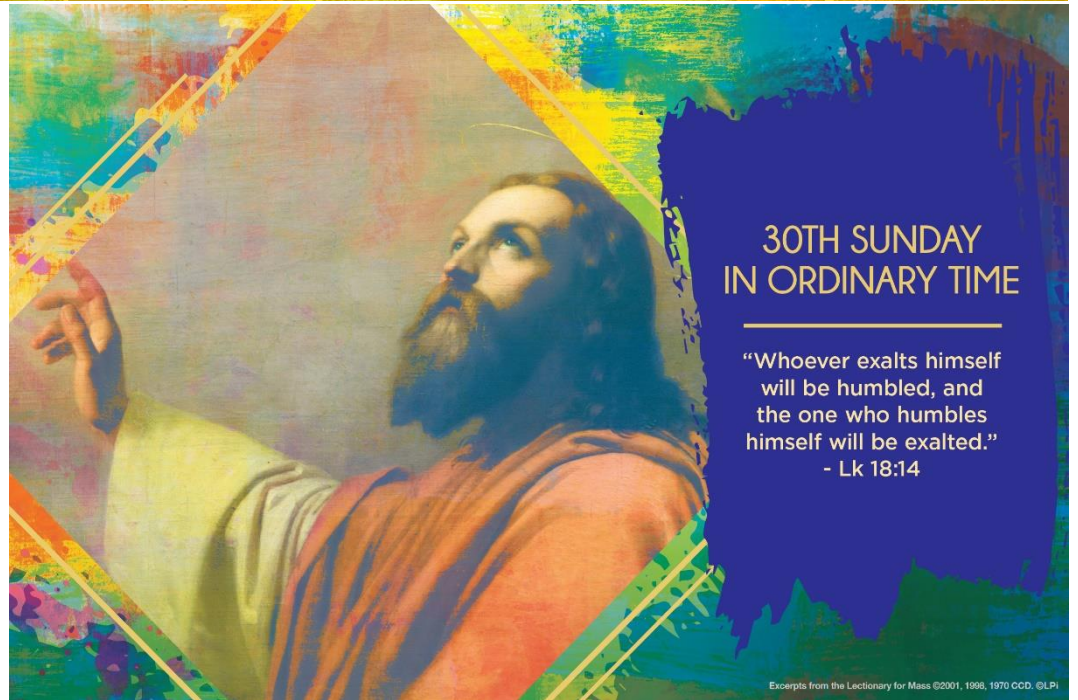

Tax collectors were considered cheats and frauds—Jewish turncoats who worked for the enemy. The Pharisees were well-respected people of learning who were called to keep the people true to their faith and heritage. In the parable of the Pharisee and the tax collector, the Pharisee looks at the tax collector at the back of the temple and thanks God he is not like him. Whenever I hear this reading, I think of the supposedly Christian proverb: “There, but for the grace of God, go I.”

I have heard folks quote this phrase when they see someone who is homeless or destitute or storm-ravaged, as if it is God’s lack of grace that caused their situation or problem. I have heard others use it when they hear about some convicted felon or murderer. They forget that they undoubtedly have also refused God’s grace and failed in some areas of their own lives.

Only someone who can honestly confess no sin could say, “There, but for the

grace of God, go I,” without exemplifying the pride of the Pharisee. Quite frankly the only proverb truly worthy of a Christian when observing another person is: “There go I.”

Christ is in each person I encounter, whatever his faith or lack of faith. Christ is in all creation both on this earth and in this universe. We are all brothers and sisters, all one with God in the family of God. It is only when we can truly see our connection, this oneness that is God’s plan, that God’s kingdom will come.

**PERSONAL RESPONSE:** What person or types of persons in our society do you find it difficult to accept? How can you overcome this lack of love?

# GOD KNOWS NO FAVORITES



To be humble means to see ourselves as we are. It comes with the recognition that we are never perfect, better than another, or free of sin. The humble person knows their faults and failings as well as their successes and triumphs. They also realize that they are nothing without God, especially God’s mercy. The humble one knows who they are, who they can be, and how they have fallen short. Being desperately in love with God, they know how they have sometimes given in to their desires rather than God’s will, almost with a sense of embarrassment. Being justified in our relationship with God is not about a list of the good things we do and the bad things we don’t. We are vindicated when we realize how totally dependent we are upon God’s gratuitous, abundant, and unconditional love. It is a gift we often take for granted and is often unappreciated.

## QUESTIONS OF THE WEEK

**First Reading:** Sirach teaches us that the Lord hears the prayers of those most vulnerable — the oppressed, the widow, the orphan, and the poor — because God cares deeply about justice. Who do you know in those categories? How can you reach out to them?

**Second Reading:** In his second letter to Timothy, Paul speaks of his impending death and in his firm belief that he will receive a just reward for his ministry. When you think about the end of your life — what do you believe will happen to you for eternity?

**Gospel Reading:** In the parable of the Pharisee and tax collector, Jesus teaches crowds the proper approach to prayer: “O God, be merciful to me a sinner.” What do you think God says in response?

## WEEKLY JUSTICE CHALLENGES

Sunday’s Responsorial Psalm proclaims that “The Lord hears the cry of the poor.” The question is: Do WE hear the cry of those in need—in our families, in our communities, in our country, and even in the world? Or are we too focused on our own issues and worries that we tune out the cries of those around us? Your challenge this week is to listen. Be open to hearing the cries of those who suffer from injustice, hatred, hunger, poverty, loneliness, or whatever might be keeping them from living in hope and joy. Listen to people’s stories; listen to the news; just listen. Then choose one voice you have heard and decide how you can reach out and help the person whose cry spoke to your heart. It might be just listening further, or it might be donating time or money. The important thing is that you respond to the cry you have heard.

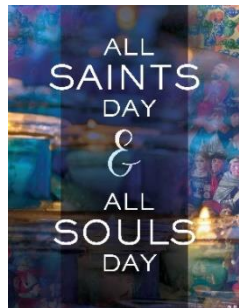

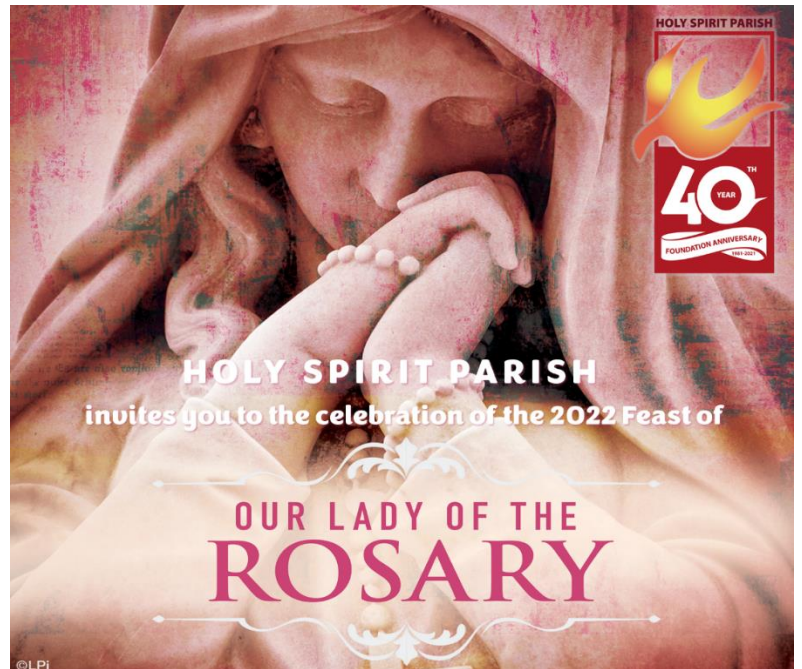

Take home with you a tri-fold brochure available in the foyer that explains on how to get started with an Advent Wreath.

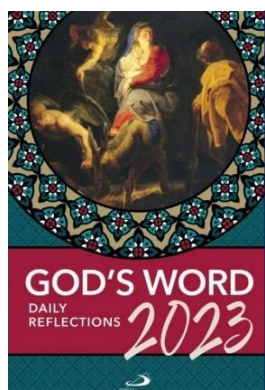
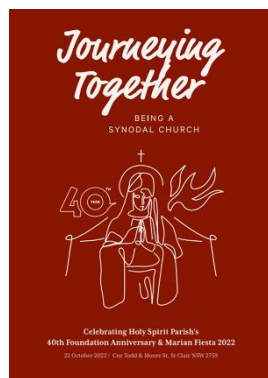

**WHY DO WE DO THAT?  
Catholic Life Explained**

**Question:**

What is a sacramental seal and where did it come from?

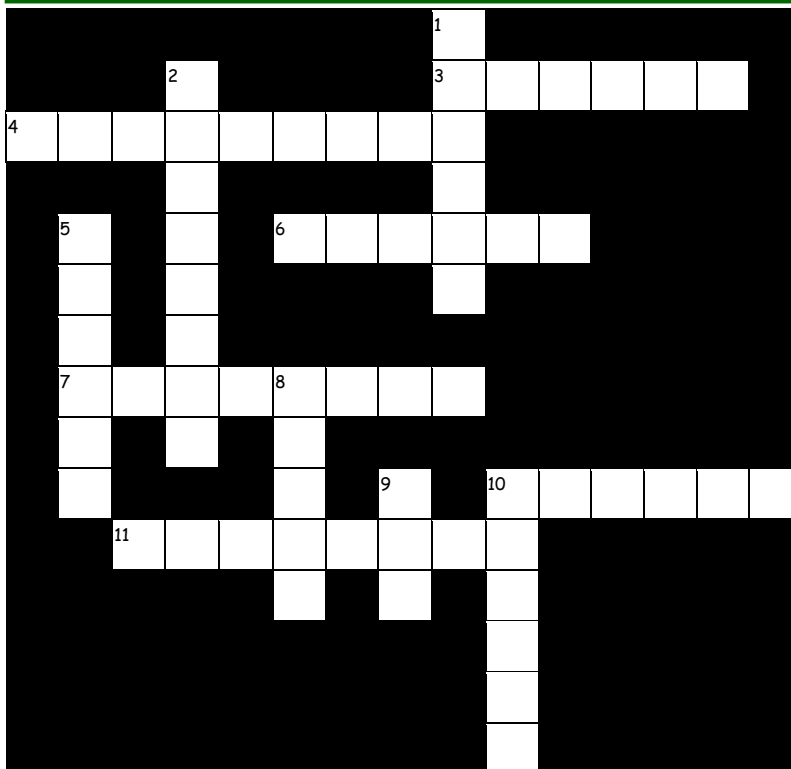
**Answer:**

Leaving more than just a memory, there are some events in our life that are truly transforming, making us different people. The same thing can be said of spiritual things, especially sacraments. A sacramental seal or character is a theological concept to describe the life-changing and permanent effect of three sacraments on the person: baptism, confirmation, and holy orders. The Catechism of the Catholic Church teaches that these sacraments confer a seal “by which the Christian shares in Christ’s priesthood and is made a member of the Church according to different states and functions. This configuration to Christ and the Church, brought about by the Spirit, is indelible” (#1121).

Once we receive these sacraments, we are forever changed. It’s a spiritual “point of no return” whereby we take a step forward in our faith journey. We are marked as people of faith, as those who have received the Spirit and as those called to serve in ordained ministry. That is why these sacraments are received only once. The direction is set, the choice is made, and we are called by God to be his people. Nothing can change that, not even our own sinfulness.

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**CREATION CARE TIPS**

Today we celebrate World Mission Sunday, and this week we celebrate the feast of Saint Anthony of Claret, a Spanish missionary and founder of the religious institute of missionaries known as the Claretians. As the head of the Archdiocese of Santiago in Cuba, Anthony advocated for family-owned farms for the poor of Cuba, believing that if they produced a variety of foods they could feed their families and sell the rest on the market to become self-sufficient.

Your challenge this week is to visit a farmer’s market or make a point to buy something from a small, local, family-owned farm rather than buying the supermarket chain store version produced by farms owned by multi-national corporations. If you want to learn more about this issue, check out Barbara Kingsolver’s book *Animal, Vegetable, Miracle* or Michael Pollan’s *Omnivore’s Dilemma* or *In Defense of Food*.
