In the first part of this reading Jesus seems to offer parents a freeway to the kingdom. It would seem the kingdom is ours if we live by the Ten Commandments and teach our children to do the same. However, as the reading goes on, Jesus tells us that his followers are challenged to do even more.

To be Jesus' followers, we are to live beyond the letter of the law. For example, it is not enough to say we won't hurt anyone physically (the fifth commandment). Jesus tells us we are not to hurt anyone emotionally either. We must curb our anger. We shouldn't insult others, and we certainly don't call them names. Finally, if we have hurt someone, we offer a sincere apology and try to make amends.

This is definitely a lesson we teach our children by example. All parents lose their tempers occasionally. Regrettably, when I was raising my children, it was more than occasionally. Fortunately, I learned the importance of saying I was sorry once things had calmed down; and to say it with

more than words. I would try to take their hand or sit close to them making sure to look them in the eyes. I would tell them I was wrong, not in the dispute perhaps, but in the way I'd handled it.

As time went on, I learned that by making myself admit I was wrong (something not easy for me to do) I became more aware of what triggered my temper. I learned to walk out of the room before exploding. And because I was modelling the behaviour, it was easier for me to make sure my children did the same. Teaching children to admit they are wrong and say they are sorry to a sibling certainly bring us, and them, a little closer to the kingdom.

FAMILY RESPONSE: Ask each person to talk about the things that make them angry. Talk about how they feel when someone tells them they are sorry. Ask younger children to show you their happy faces and then their angry faces.

QUESTIONS OF THE WEEK

First Reading:

Second Reading:

Paul instructs the Corinthians about the power of the Holy Spirit who guides believers to a mature faith and to understanding God's wisdom. In what ways do you experience the Holy Spirit in your life?

As Jesus continues with his Sermon on the Mount, he addresses a variety of topics in the daily life of his Jewish audience (the Law, anger, adultery, divorce, and oaths), only now filtered through God's point of view. How can Christians today live daily life according to these standards?

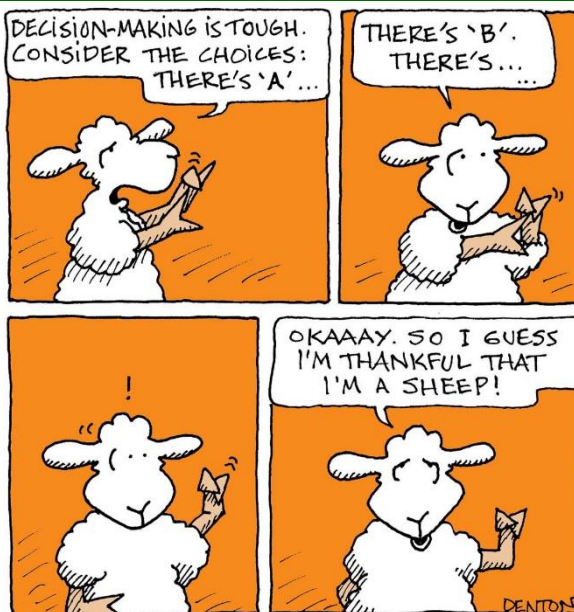
WEEKLY JUSTICE CHALLENGES

The Gospel for Sunday is part of the Sermon on the Mount. Jesus is focusing on keeping the commandments. He emphasizes that the Fifth Commandment, "Thou shalt not kill," means more than not taking someone's life. It also means not being angry or destroying someone's self-esteem by calling them names. Your challenge this week is to look at your life and examine where you might have hurt someone—physically, emotionally through negative gossip, cyber criticism, or derogatory words, or even spiritually by giving bad example. Make a commitment to changing that hurtful behavior, say a prayer for the person you have hurt, and try to have the courage to ask forgiveness in person.

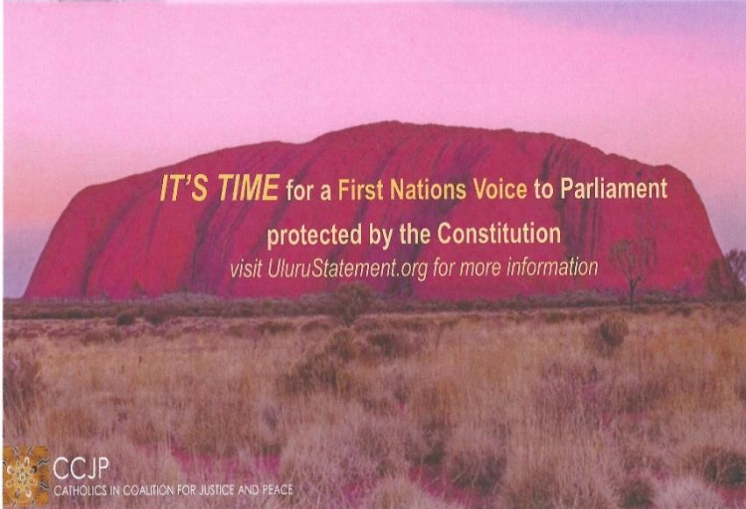

Pat Anderson is an Alyawarre woman known nationally and internationally as an advocate for the rights and health of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people. Ms Anderson is Chair of the Lowitja Institute and has extensive experience in Aboriginal health, including community development, policy formation and research ethics. She was appointed an Officer of the Order of Australia (AO) in 2014 for distinguished service to the Indigenous community as a social justice advocate, particularly through promoting improved health, and educational and protection outcomes for children. Ms Anderson was Co-Chair of the Referendum Council that released its final report in 2017 and has since led the work of the Uluru Dialogue in partnership with the ILC UNSW.

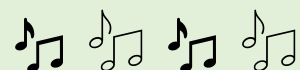

**WHY DO WE DO THAT?
Catholic Life Explained**

Question:

What do the colors of the priest’s and deacon’s vestments mean?

Answer:

In the Roman Rite of the Catholic Church, the colors of the vestments evolved over the course of several centuries and there was wide variation both in the colors used, and in the feasts and seasons associated with particular colors. It was Pope Innocent III (d. 1216) who gave us the basic outline that was later prescribed by Pope Saint Pius V in 1570. The various colors remind us of the dominant themes of a particular season or celebration.

- **White:** Used for the seasons of Christmas and Easter and in celebrations of the Lord, of Mary, the angels, and saints who were not martyrs. This color is also used in Masses for the dead, at baptisms, weddings and other festive celebrations.

- **Red:** As the color of both blood and fire, red is used on Palm Sunday and Good Friday, as well as Pentecost and special celebrations of the Holy Spirit. Moreover, red is used on the feasts and memorials of the Apostles and those saints who died as martyrs.

- **Violet:** The color for Advent and Lent. Violet may also be used in Masses for the dead and on All Souls Day (November 2).

- **Green:** A color of life and hope, green is used throughout Ordinary Time.

- **Other colors:** Rose may be used on the Third Sunday of Advent and the Fourth Sunday of Lent, black may be used in Masses of the dead and on All Souls Day, gold or silver may be used on solemn occasions in place of white, red, or green. ©LPi
