'When Wheat Grains Produce a Rich Harvest!'

Dear Friends,

The Scripture readings for Lent are quite diverse and paint a rich tapestry that sets the scene for our celebration of the Death and Resurrection of Jesus – Jesus tempted by Satan, Jesus transfigured in the company of the apostles, Jesus' prophetic cleansing of the Temple, Jesus' revelation of his mission to Nicodemus, and today's wisdom, '*When I am lifted up from the earth, I shall draw all to myself!*'

Like Jesus, one way or another we learn to obey through suffering which is part of the fabric of our lives. Even then, our growth is largely hidden even from ourselves – but eventually we 'get it'! I wonder how much of Jesus' message his disciples Andrew and Philip and the other hearers understood as they listened to him – did they 'get it'? At this stage of my life, I am coming to realise it is often in the life and death of someone we know that we finally 'get it'! It may be someone close, a family member or friend, a fellow Augustinian in our Province or one with whom I studied many years ago.

I recall my close friend Fr Tom Martin, Augustinian scholar and university

professor. We lived together in community in Chicago in the 1990s and Tom later visited Australia and worked with us on Augustinian spirituality. A very fit, avid runner, always positive individual, he was diagnosed with cancer in 2008. Many of us walked the final journey with Tom, even though thousands of kilometres separated us. At the end, we all agreed, '*Tom taught us how to live, and he taught us how to die!*'

We teach each other – the wheat grain does not always mean physical death but the patient acceptance of family crisis, personal loss, loneliness and depression, serious illness, endurance of treatment – lessons family members and parishioners even now teach us daily – a rich harvest before our eyes.

Underlying this is that wonderful realization that no experience, success or failure, good act or sinful one is wasted, as God forms us in his likeness – a recognition of the wheat grain needing to fall on the ground and die if it is to yield a rich harvest.

LIVE THE LITURGY Inspiration of the Week



How do we convince people that God's law is written upon their hearts? God is wedded to God's people. This is a simple and fundamental fact of life. Yet, many ignore this truth and carry on as if they, or humanity as a whole, are the center of the universe. As a grain of wheat has to fall to the ground and die in order to become what it really is, we too must die to our secular images and ideas of ourselves so that we can become who God really made us to be. If all of us kept our focus on God's deep bonded love with human beings, indeed with our very self, then there would be no need to teach others this fundamental life lesson. They would simply know this truth, as Jeremiah tells us. Somehow, perhaps through original and personal sin, we have lost sight of this reality. We have lost our way and our axis. It is time to find our way back, to learn the virtue of obedience, to pay attention to what God is saying and become aware of the Divine Love that is the reason for all creation. Then, even in our darkest hour when all may seem to be lost, we can say as did Jesus, the model of obedience, "Father, glorify your name," By this perseverance, people can come to know the Lord and what God has done.

First Reading:

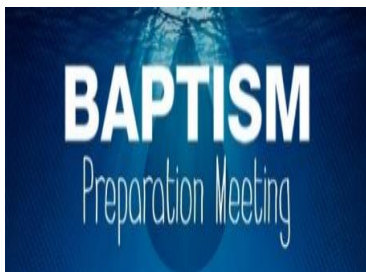

WEEKLY JUSTICE CHALLENGES

March 22 is World Water Day. The foundation of all Catholic social teaching is respect for the life and dignity of every human person. Fundamental to both life itself and life lived with dignity is access to clean water. Around the world, millions of people—elderly people, children, and all ages in between—suffer because of a scarcity of water. Your challenge this week is two-fold. First, examine how your family uses water. Do you conserve it as a precious and God-given resource which is not unlimited? Pay attention to how much water you waste (e.g., letting water run while you are brushing your teeth instead of just using it to get your toothbrush wet at the beginning and to rinse at the end). Then on Saturday, discuss how you can limit your use of water and commit to it—at least for the rest of the Lenten season. Secondly, decide on one way you can support people in areas of the world which do not have clean water. You might want to research programs of Catholic Relief Services which help people dig wells or purify contaminated water. (Go to www.crs.org for details). Then make a donation on behalf of those denied dignity by helping them receive life-giving water.

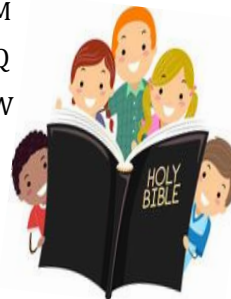
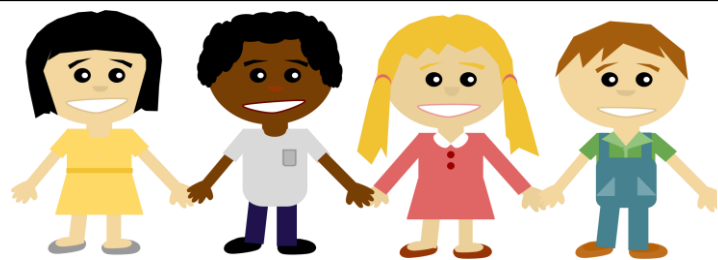

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CREATION CARE TIPS

March 22nd is World Water Day. The average household in the United States uses more than 333 gallons of water a day, 70 percent for indoor use. This week, decrease your water usage. Reduce your shower length. Water indoor plants using collected rainwater. If possible, use a dishwasher and minimize rinsing/washing by hand. Don't wash clothing more frequently than necessary and fill it instead of running half loads. If there is a dripping faucet in your house, call a plumber or take some time to fix the leak this week.



WHY DO WE DO THAT? Catholic Life Explained:

Question:

What is spiritual communion, and do you need to be in a state of grace to receive it?

Answer:

The practice of making a "spiritual communion dates" back several centuries and St. Thomas Aquinas described it as "an ardent desire to receive Jesus in the Holy Sacrament and a loving embrace as though we had already received Him." Traditionally, a prayer of spiritual communion has been used by those who are unable to receive sacramental communion because of health, inability to attend Mass, or who cannot receive communion because of grave sin.

This practice has been encouraged by many saints and spiritual writers and most recently Pope Francis encouraged the practice when the realities of the COVID-19 pandemic prevented so many Catholics from taking part in the Mass or receiving sacramental communion.

Although the graces offered in spiritual communion are not the same as those offered in the sacramental communion of the Mass, this practice is still a powerful opportunity to express our desire for union with the Lord and to be united with Christ and the Church, even in an imperfect way.
