

### EASTER – 'Looking after our Faith!'

Dear Friends,

On more than one occasion I've recalled the story of the Archbishop of Tunis who urged us to *'look after our faith'*! During the days of Lent and Holy Week, the larger than usual crowds at times remind us of what it means to be Church, to quote St Augustine (Sermon 336,1.6):

The thronging crowd of this congregation is the dedication of a house of prayer. The house then of our prayers is the one before our eyes, but we ourselves are the house of God. If we ourselves are the house of God, we are being built up in this age, that at the end of the age we may be dedicated....

'By becoming Christians, (people) are like stones newly quarried on the mountains or timber felled in the forests. When they are catechised, baptised, formed, they are, as it were, hewn of the hands of workers and craftspeople, they are set in line and evened up.... cemented together by love...'

The Easter Event is **God's Great Surprise** – the incredible love of our God who says again and again, **'Trust me?'** Though we celebrate the Resurrection of

Christ throughout the Church year, we can very easily take the reality for granted and at times become a bit flat in our faith. The disciples at the tomb were stunned at the emptiness. We should be stunned that Christ is risen!

As a Parish Community, we do look after our Faith and each other's Faith too. At the Easter Vigil, our friends in the RCIA Program remind us all of the treasure of our Catholic Faith as they embrace Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist. Parish members on the RCIA Team have walked with them. Care for our Faith is also the focus of our Sacramental Program, RCIC and Baptism Preparation Teams too and we thank all those involved in formation of others in Faith.

This focus on Faith extends to our family and friends, and Jesus' Rising at Easter reminds us of our need to live the Easter Message and enjoy Jesus' intimate friendship with us and cultivate faith in our families – our way to 'look after our faith'!

May we walk always in newness of life as we rejoice in his Resurrection and celebrate who we are – Easter People!

#### LIVE THE LITURGY Inspiration of the Week



Each of the four Gospels recounts slightly different details of Jesus' resurrection. Yet they all begin with a note that the stone which had sealed the tomb has been rolled away, and that the tomb where Jesus' body was laid is now empty. Those who first saw these things were confused and couldn't understand what they were seeing. Despite Jesus' predictions during his lifetime that he would die and be raised from the dead, none of his followers seemed able to comprehend immediately what had happened. Some Jews at the time of Jesus believed there would be a general resurrection of all of the dead at the end of time. Others, like the Sadducees, didn't even believe in that. It's no wonder, then, that it took some time for Mary Magdalene, Peter, and the "other disciple" (also known as the "Beloved Disciple) to piece together the incredible news that Jesus had been raised from the dead. John tells us that the other disciple was the first to see and believe, but also that they didn't yet understand what Scripture meant that Jesus had to rise from the dead. T he Acts of the Apostles, which follow the lives of the apostles after Jesus' resurrection, shows how they gradually came to understand more and more in the days, weeks, and years afterwards the implications of the resurrection. They had nothing in their experiences to compare this to as they lived into a completely new reality-a lived experience of life after death. Their hearts would have felt the joy long before their minds could make sense of Jesus' resurrection.

#### **QUESTIONS OF THE WEEK:**

#### First Reading:

We hear today part of the speech that Peter delivered in the household of Cornelius, a centurion and Gentile-believer in Christ. Peter bore witness o his experiences with Jesus, including Jesus' resurrection. To whom do you bear witness to your faith in the resurrected Jesus?

#### **Second Reading:**


Paul urges the Colossians to remain focused on Jesus' resurrection, ascension, and final return — to "seek what is above." What do you find appealing in this spiritual exercise?

#### **Gospel Reading:**

Mark's account of Jesus' resurrection focuses on the women's discovery of the empty tomb. In fact, Jesus risen from the tomb is the original ending of the Gospel of Mark. Why do you think Mark would end his Gospel with the empty tomb?

# WEEKLY JUSTICE CHALLENGES

The Good News of the Resurrection is proclaimed this week in our Scripture readings. And this good news is meant for everyone. Jesus was and is a universal savior. One of the insights we receive on Easter Sunday comes from Acts 10. Peter, struggling to be faithful to the teachings of Jesus, announces that he has learned that "God shows no partiality". This helped to shape many decisions made by the early Church leaders—and it should form our decisions as well. Your challenge this week is examine how well you live by God's example. Do you personally and/or as a household show partiality to particular groups of people based on their race, religion, economic level, occupation? Do you exclude any groups on the same basis? If your reflection reveals partiality to some and exclusion of others, make a commitment to change. Identify three steps you can take so that in the future you can in all sincerity say that you, like God, show no partiality. ©Center for Ministry Development. #### 60TH ANNIVERSARY OF RELIGIOUS PROFESSION - A REFLECTION FROM FR DAVE

It is 60 years since I took my First Vows as an Augustinian at the novitiate in Rochester, Victoria, on 27 March 1964 - Good Friday morning actually. I was 18 years of age, far too young to make such a commitment, but that's the way we did things at the time.

Religious Profession is different from Ordination and relates to one's choice of lifestyle in the Church, taking religious vows of poverty, chastity and obedience. Religious life in the 'Augustinian Way' is the setting in which Augustinians live – community life, sharing all things in common, following the ancient Rule of St Augustine, and serving the Church as priests if they are so called.

I was taught by Augustinians who made a big impression on me and that prompted me to want to join the Order in the first place. I recall their coming to my mother's funeral. I was very moved and wondered why they would do that. I discovered that's what Augustinians do!



The Augustinians' contentment in vocation reflects a down-to-earth, sensible and compassionate approach – like our present Pope Francis. 'Joy of the Gospel' sums up his approach to the Catholic Faith – very Augustinian. The call to religious life and priesthood continues to be a Joy for me – especially ministry in all its variety – much of the time it seems like I am just beginning!

My Augustinian story has many dimensions – our schools, community life, pastoral work in parishes and other settings, collaboration with Augustinians in the Asia-Pacific, leadership opportunities – as well as watching our younger men grow and mature in their vocation, take their vows, diaconate and priesthood – the Province's achievements in Korea and Thailand and our recent beginnings in Vietnam.

It's great to be an Augustinian! Since Vatican II, we Augustinians have rediscovered St Augustine, his story and spirituality, and shared this treasure among ourselves and with our lay sisters and brothers, particularly through Friends of St Augustine. This movement has enriched our ministry and friendship.

St Augustine has a saying that 'God sees much more good in us than we see in ourselves.' – what's more, God trusts us. I thank the Province and the Order for the hundredfold that Augustinian life has been for me over the years.

I owe deep love and gratitude to my family. My decision to become an Augustinian was not an easy one for them, yet I now see the seeds of my vocation in a home where religion and faith were part of normal living – in the life of my Catholic Mum, a true saint in her common sense and faith, and the life of my Anglican Dad, a man of true goodness and simple faith. In our family, close friendship remains our treasure – it's who we are.

In conclusion, I thank each of you for your friendship and support over these many years. We need to celebrate – friendship, family, the richness of Augustinian religious life, the fragile gift of priesthood, the gift of many years of love <u>from</u> the Church and service <u>to</u> the Church. St Paul's message to the Philippians is fitting here: 'I thank my God each time I think of you and when I pray for you, I pray with Joy!'

Pay attention to the new life around you this week: the new flowers, new green shoots on the trees, etc. Spend time in nature, searching for and recognizing the signs of the Risen Lord in the natural world around you.







# WHY DO WE DO THAT? Catholic Life Explained:

#### Question:

Confessing Sins Question: If I go to the Sacrament of Penance and end up repeating the same sins, does that mean I do not have a strong enough intention to amend my life?

#### **Answer:**

There is a popular expression that says, "Be patient. God isn't finished with me vet!" Growing in faith and holiness is an ongoing, life-long project, and our struggle with sin is at the heart of it. As St. Paul says, the good he intends to do, he does not do. The evil he does not intend, he does! It is not always a lack of intention, but more often the allure of evil that makes it difficult to change. When we confess our sins, we are to come with a fully contrite heart. You need to reflect on your true feelings toward your actions before approaching sacrament. After confession, there are strategies you can make to avoid falling into the same traps of sin. First, pray for and seek out strength and perseverance through multiple sacraments, charitable work, and personal sacrifice. Second, avoid occasions of sin when you might fail or be sorely tempted. In doing these things, remind yourself daily that it is a spiritual war we wage, and with God's grace we will succeed.
