Easter Presence - 'Being At Home With God!'

Dear Friends,

The engaging image of the vine and the branches in today's Gospel focuses on the close intimacy between ourselves and Jesus – 'communion' in fact. Connectedness, belonging, being 'at home' are all core aspects of our Christian life and our

relationship with God. 'Communion' is much more than simply receiving Jesus in the Eucharist. It certainly extends to our bonds with one another as Church but goes far beyond that to what unites the whole human family for whom Jesus embraced our human condition. Celebrations of joy and peace unite us but so do the realities that challenge us. St Augustine reminds us that, just as bread and wine are changed, so is the community – both essential because the Eucharist makes the Church and binds us together.

Vine and branches describe both the reality and the dream Jesus has for his relationship with Church and World. Jesus' vision for his relationship with us is of a continuing union in every dimension of our lives. His friendship is life-giving but it needs to be reciprocal if it is to be true; oneway friendships, as we know well, have no future.

The art of gardening involves pruning if a plant or a tree is to reach its full potential. Translating that concept into the human sphere is not easy because very few of us like change. Yet our difficult experiences usually leave us little choice and the 'pruning' makes our efforts more fruitful in love, patience, kindness, gentleness and other qualities.

The invitation to be 'at home' with God is an attractive one but, like all relationships, it takes care and time if it is to give life. The Easter Season is the ideal time to reflect on Jesus' invitation to 'living communion' in the intimate context of vine and branches:

'Abide in me as I abide in you... If you abide in me and my words abide in you, ask for whatever you wish, and it will be done for you' (In 15:4,7).

LIVE THE LITURGY Inspiration of the Week



Anyone familiar with gardening knows that proper and timely pruning is essential. The health of the plant depends upon it. An unpruned tree can quickly produce suckers that zap many of the essential nutrients from its body. Pruning requires patience and vision. Studies reveal that plants often respond defensively to being pruned, displaying reactions that are similar to hurt or discomfort. Pruning is not easy but necessary.

A hard lesson for us to learn is that we also need to be pruned. We become far healthier when we allow God to stretch, refine, and form us into the best version of ourselves. The fruit that then comes from our vines will be more abundant, nutritious, and robust. Left to our own devices we can easily find ourselves running amuck and spiraling out of control. Without a proper vision and trust in the Master Pruner, we will never find the contentment we desperately desire. Nor will the work of the Gospel stand a chance of succeeding.

QUESTIONS OF THE WEEK:

First Reading:

Luke tells us how the conversion of Saul (Paul) and the acceptance by the isciples of him helped facilitate peace in the Church throughout Judea, Galilee, and Samaria. What do you think is needed to bring about peace in our Church today?

Second Reading:

John teaches his community that believing in Jesus and loving one nother is the heart of God's commandment. How would you assess yourself in following this two-fold command?

Gospel Reading:

Using the metaphor of a vine and branches, Jesus urges his disciples to "remain in me" in order to bear good fruit and thereby glorify God. What would be some examples of "good fruit" that you have produced?

WEEKLY JUSTICE CHALLENGES

On May 1st we honor St. Joseph as the patron saint of workers. Did you know that May 1 is also Holocaust Remembrance Day? That might sound grim; after all, who wants to remember something so unspeakably evil? But the maxim that those who don't learn from history are doomed to repeat it has been proven true time and time again in human history. Remembering the holocaust is one way to ensure that we never again experience a similar event. Your challenge this week is to reflect on the holocaust which took place in Hitler's Germany. Discuss as a household what you know about it. Research why it happened, and how Hitler got so many people caught up in trying to exterminate an entire race of people. Then ask yourself what little steps of prejudice and hatred led up to the big "Final Solution" of seeking extinction for the entire Jewish people. Commit yourself and your family to confronting one of the little steps towards racism or prejudice wherever you see it. This might be as simple as standing up to people who make jokes at the expense of a particular group of people; it could mean advocating with the government to oppose regimes across the world which engage in genocide. Whatever you decide to do, hold all of the victims of the holocaust in your heart as you work to make sure that history does not repeat itself. Help the victims to not have died in vain.

CREATION CARE TIPS

"Little children, let us love, not in word or speech, but in truth and action." –1 John 3:18. Put your care for creation into action this week. This week, replace your old lightbulbs with energy efficient ones. Replace store-bought cleaners (which contain harsh chemicals that can be destructive to the environment) with homemade and/or natural cleaners such as vinegar, lemon juice, baking soda, or biodegradable cleaners. Search online for easy-to-make recipes for common house-cleaning solutions.



WHY DO WE DO THAT? Catholic Life Explained:

Question:

Is gossip a mortal sin?

Answer:

To really ask this question, we must consider the Eighth Commandment: "You shall not bear false witness."

In its reflections on this commandment. The Catechism of the Catholic Church invites us to not only think about what bearing "false witness" means, but to also consider how we understand the truth and how communicate we more broadly. This is why so much of this section of the Catechism has to do with the gift of language. With this in mind, we will notice that the word "gossip" isn't used by the Catechism. Instead, we find the words "detraction" and "calumny," which are actually two forms that gossip can take, and both can be quite serious.

First, detraction is the of revealing "another's faults and failings to persons who did not know them," without morally valid reasons. Calumny, by extension, is saying something about another person that is untrue, and it is sinful because it "harms the reputation of others and gives occasion for false judgements" (see no. 2477).

In all of our communication, we have to always recognize that we have a moral obligation to the truth and to always work to protect the reputation and honor of our neighbors (see no. 2479).

Gossip can, in fact, prove to be a very serious sin. After all, the Catechism reminds us: "No one is bound to reveal the truth to someone who does not have the right to know it" (no. 2489). When we have gossiped, especially if we are aware we have damaged another person's good name or reputation, we want to make every effort to undo the damage we have done, including seeking the grace and forgiveness offered in the Sacrament of Reconciliation. @LPi
