Church as Community - ‘Moments of Grace!’

Dear Friends,

During recent weeks, 100 Augustinian laity from across the world gathered in Rome for the Augustinian Lay Congress, including several parishioners from Holy Spirit. Themes included Augustinian Spirituality and Synodality. We look forward to hearing from them in coming days as they recall their significant experiences and **‘moments of grace’**.

We need to be alert to the **‘moments of grace’** in our lives, our families and community. Celebration of the Sacrament of Confirmation last term was one of these. This week, our children and their families begin preparation for First Holy Communion. Participation in the Eucharist is an essential part of our life in the Church - a shared moment of grace and experience of Church Community - *Church in the Family, Church in the Home, the Domestic Church.*

Moments of grace are not just about ‘churchy stuff’ but are at the heart of daily life - moments when we recognize the presence and gift of God who is alive in us and in our love for one another - times of joy, family bonding, falling in love, success, friendship and love-making, miracle of birth, rites of passage, as well as times of illness, sadness, loss, bereavement, farewell, and other life-changing moments. Even when we are not aware of God’s closeness, he’s there anyway. For Christians, living a full life is **incarnational** - Jesus embraced our humanness and made it holy, full of **‘moments of grace’** from beginning to end.

St Augustine, despite his early life struggles, retained a strong sense of the presence of God in his life. He was open to and eventually the full reality dawned on him as his inner spirit was awakened and he experienced his conversion, his life changed radically from then onwards. The Eucharist took on a whole new meaning for him, as he received Christ in Communion.

Not only does the flesh and blood of Christ change each of us, the Eucharist changes the community - an important reason why each Sunday a Parish Mass is offered *‘pro populo’* - *‘for the people of the Parish’*. The community’s faith makes the Eucharist even more special. A unique memory that comes to mind is the Sunday Masses I concelebrated in Rome at Augustinian Lay Congresses in 2012 and 2019 and offered *‘pro populo’*. In 2019, it was in St Peter’s Basilica in Latin - the first Latin Mass I have concelebrated in over 50 years as a priest.

Our personal and communal life is bound up with our shared Baptism and how we see and experience the Church, so let’s not miss the **‘moments of grace’** wherever they occur. I share with you the inspired words of retired Bishop Giovanni Scanavino OSA, reflecting on Baptism and our need to communicate its great meaning at family level: **‘We have the love of God in our hearts, so look into the eyes of the newly-baptised baby and see the light and the smile of God’s Spirit of love in his/her heart.’** Why not share your **‘moments of grace’** as a family this weekend?

LIVE THE LITURGY Inspiration of the Week



God shows up in unexpected ways! Just when we think we have God's agenda figured out, another surprise comes. Expecting to find God only in some places hinders us from finding Him everywhere. Who would have thought that a young boy's few loaves and fishes would feed thousands of people? The disciples were probably just as amazed as everyone else when this feast appeared before them. Sometimes, we find it difficult to believe that God can do amazing things with something small and simple. Yet, grasping this truth is really at the heart of understanding the power of the Eucharist. Having the Body and Blood of Christ made present for us is one amazing wonder. Actually being fed and nourished by that gift is another. Now being able to become what we have eaten, God can do tremendous things with the simple, humble gifts of our lives. All we have to do is realize that God dwells within us. When we do, then everyone we encounter and everything we do has the power to become a sacramental moment. When done with great love even the smallest gesture can be multiplied exponentially. Now, that's amazing!

QUESTIONS OF THE WEEK

First Reading: The prophet Elisha was able to feed a crowd of a hundred people with only twenty barley loaves and some fresh grain. Why do you think God empowered Elisha to perform this feeding miracle?

Second Reading: Paul taught the Ephesians that as believers we are called to live by the moral imperatives of humility, gentleness, patience, love, and peace. Which of these virtues do you think you do well?

Gospel: The people mistakenly thought of Jesus as "the Prophet who is to come into world" after the multiplication of the loaves and fishes. What are some times when you have seen others misuse or misrepresent Jesus?

WEEKLY JUSTICE CHALLENGES

Most of us want to be part of a winning team or be part of something that works or is doing really well! We love to give to organizations that reach lots of people and do the most good. This week the readings include accounts of people who did things differently. The first was the story of Jesus feeding the five thousand. This account in John includes the little boy who shared his fish and barley loaves. From that, Jesus and the disciples fed five thousand and had food left over. The disciples wanted to do the normal thing... send everyone out for takeout or a drive-through. But Jesus used the faith of the little boy to do things differently. That boy might have felt a little foolish looking around at all the people and then looking at his own little basket. However, he had faith. He just had to do what he was called to do...share his food. Another encounter in Scripture has Jesus preaching in Nazareth where he is booted out of town. People couldn't take him seriously; he had grown up in their midst. They knew his story. Jesus wanted to share what he had with them, but they didn't want it. He chose to leave and to use it as a lesson for the disciples. If you are not welcome, just shake the dust from your sandals and move on... their loss. What a great challenge for us, to follow our heart and do God's will even if it looks foolish or we are rejected. This week, pray for God to show you where your presence and gifts are needed. Make a list of people, places and causes that you might be called to serve. Choose one and take a step out in faith to make a difference.

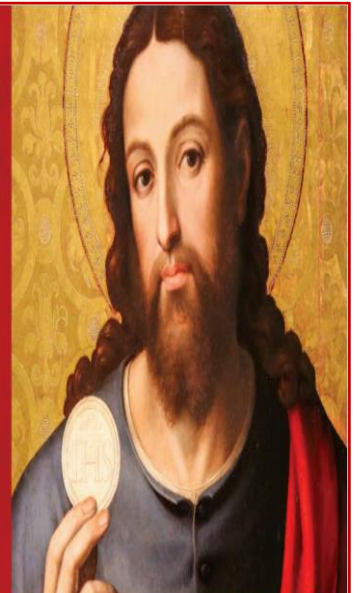
Friends of St Augustine will meet on Tuesday 30 July at 7:00pm in the Pioneers Room, anyone interested in attending will be most welcome.

**WHY DO WE DO THAT?
Catholic Life Explained:**

Question:

We are considering homeschooling our children. Does this present a problem when it is time for them to receive the sacraments? What must we do?

Answer:

Homeschooling is legal in all fifty states and like other types of education, has its advantages and its drawbacks. There are many factors to consider, and each family has to decide what the best way to educate its children is. With religious education, many dioceses have a formal policy that outlines procedures and expectations, some of which include more than just academic information. Call the religious education office to find out what they are for your area.

In general, though, an appointment with your parish priest to discuss your situation is the best first step. An opportunity to discuss what is available, what the expectations are for each sacrament, and how you can best prepare your child helps make your time of preparation more effective. The priest can direct you to good catechetical materials, parent information classes, and other choices and possibilities for your child. All parents need to be part of their child's religious education, taking a lead in instilling the values and beliefs of their faith. Communication and information helps us all to teach and preach the Gospel as Jesus did.

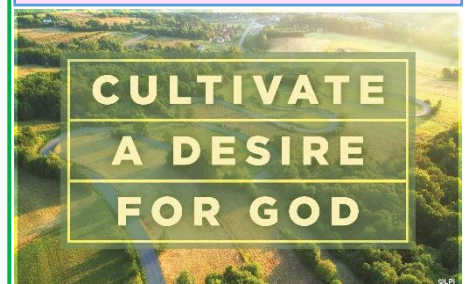
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CREATION CARE TIPS
